John Flyatt one of the Privy Councilors of
the Admiralty and Tottenham Court Chapel London thinking it prudent
while I possess my reason to dispose of what earthly property I may possess at my
death and therefore make my will as follows I give the whole amount of my life
insurance in the Equitable Assurance Office which is one thousand pounds
together with whatever addition may be made there to by the rules of that Society
to my esteemed friends Mr. Thomas Fisher of Soler Street Fitzroy Square and Mr.
Thomas Cope of Eastmarket Street I do direct to be applied as hereinafter specified
a thousand pounds to be placed at the best interest that can be obtained upon a
undoubted security which interest shall be regularly paid to my beloved wife
during her natural life and I appoint that the whole of the additional sum
received from the Equitable Assurance Society of the sum amounting one
thousand pounds be laid out in an annuity upon her life thereby to increase her
income beyond what the sum interest of the whole sum would produce also give
to my beloved wife all other property possessed by me at my death whether
consisting in money, Jewels, old furniture, plate, books &c. to be disposed of by her
as she may think proper after my funeral expenses and debts are discharged the
thousand pounds at interest at the desire of my beloved wife given as follows to
my daughter Eliza five hundred pounds to my son Charles two hundred and
fifty pounds to each of my other children namely Maria, William, George, John
and Samuel fifty pounds each should any or either of my children die before their
mother I appoint that his or her or their share as before specified be divided in equal
parts between the survivors I request that my esteemed friends Mr. Fisher and
Cope will each accept a thing in token of my great regard for them and as an
expression of my gratitude to them for any trouble which the execution of this
instrument may cause them to this my last will I do my hand and seal this
twenty sixth day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred
and six John Flyatt (J.F.) signed sealed and delivered on the day of the above
said in the presence of us Oliver Nodes / Geo. Stockdale.

Proved at London 7th April 1826 before the worshipful Henry Vane Salusbury
Doctor of Laws and Surrogate by the oaths of Thomas Fisher and Thomas Cope the
Executors to whom a citation was granted having been first sworn duly to administer

Harrison of Essex in the County of Essex Freeman signi. Swiss and Legate
unto my loving wife Ann Harrison all my Real and personal Estate Goods
Chattels rights and Effects whatsoever and wheresoever which at my death I
shall be possessed of or in any way entitled to whether possessed in fee simple or
remainder or expectancy to hold to her my said wife her heirs Executors &
Administrators and assigns for ever to and for her own benefit and disposal and
I appoint my said wife sole Executrix of this my will In witness whereof I
have hereunto set my hand and seal this seventh day of September in the year
of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eleven Wm Harrison (W.H.) signed
sealed and published and declared by the said Testator as and for his last will and
Testament in the presence of us who at his request witnessed the same and in the presence
of each other have subscribed our names as witnesses thereto Mary Strange
Flippisley Price / Wm Strange

duly to administer.
